

Oclacitinib

(**ok**-la-**sit**-ti-nib)

Key Information

- Used to treat itching due to allergic skin irritation or inflammation.
- May be given with or without food.
- Common side effects include vomiting, diarrhea, decreased appetite, and lack of energy. These usually improve with time.
- Contact your veterinarian if you notice signs of infection or any new or enlarged skin masses.
- Wash your hands immediately after handling the tablets.

Description	Anti-itch agentAvailable as oral tablets and chewable tablets
Other common names	Apoquel
Uses	 FDA-approved uses in animals: Treatment of itching in dogs with allergic skin conditions At the discretion of your veterinarian, this medication may be used in different species or for other reasons (extra-label use), such as for treatment of: Itching from other causes in dogs Allergic skin conditions in cats Asthma in cats
Before this medication is given	 No medication is 100% safe in all patients. Discuss with your veterinarian: Any other medications or supplements your animal is taking Any conditions or diseases your animal currently has or has had in the past Any side effects your animal has had to medications in the past Talk to your veterinarian if your animal will be getting allergy tested.
Warnings for animals	 Do not use in: Animals that are allergic to this medication Animals less than 1 year old Animals with serious infections Cats with feline immunodeficiency virus (FIV) or feline leukemia virus (FeLV) Pregnant, or nursing, or breeding animals Use with caution in animals: With Demodex mite infestations (demodicosis) or urinary tract infections With cancer Receiving steroids or other immunosuppressive drugs Certain medications are not allowed in some animal competitions. Check rules and regulations when your animal is taking a medication.
Warnings for humans	 Wash your hands immediately after handling the tablets. In case of accidental contact with the eyes, immediately flush eyes with water or saline for at least 15 minutes and then contact a physician.
How do I give this medication?	Give with or without food.

	Give exactly as your veterinarian has prescribed. Always follow the instructions on the prescription label.
Side effects	 Common – these side effects usually get better with time, but contact your veterinarian if they are severe, continue to occur, or worsen over time: Vomiting, diarrhea, or decreased appetite Lack of energy Severe – stop the medication and contact your veterinarian immediately if you notice any of these signs:
	 Increased itching, skin redness, skin swelling, oozing or bleeding sores, or rashes. These may be signs of a skin infection. Frequent or painful urination, lack of energy, coughing, or poor appetite. These may be signs
	of an infection. New growths or an enlargement of existing skin masses
How will I know it's working?	Your animal should start feeling better within 1 to 2 days.
	 Your veterinarian will perform follow-up tests and physical examinations to determine how well your animal is tolerating the medication and evaluate how well it is working.
	Contact your veterinary clinic if your animal's signs worsen or do not improve.
How long will the medication effects last?	This medication will stop working within 24 hours of the last dose.
How long do I give it for?	This medication can be given for different lengths of time. Give it for as long as your veterinarian tells you. You may need to refill the prescription.
Overdose	If you witness or suspect an overdose, call your veterinarian or an animal-specific poison control center (consultation fee applies): • ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center: (888) 426-4435 • Pet Poison Helpline: (855) 764-7661 Have the product or label with you if possible.
Missed dose	In most cases, if you miss a dose: • Give it when you remember, then return to the regular dosing schedule. If it is close to the time for the next dose: • Skip the missed dose. • Give the next dose at the next scheduled time. • Continue the regular dosing schedule. If you are unsure, call your veterinary clinic. Do not double-up or give extra doses.
Storage	 Store in the original container at room temperature. Keep out of reach of children and animals. The chewable forms of this medication are meant to be appealing to animals. Secure storage that is well out of reach is important to prevent accidental overdose.
Disposal	 Do not flush this medication down the toilet or wash it down the sink. This medication is very harmful to aquatic life. Options for disposing of unused or expired medications include: Drug take-back sites: This is preferred whenever possible. To find a site near you, contact your local law enforcement or waste management authorities. Home disposal: Mix the medication in with coffee grounds or kitty litter, seal the mixture in a plastic bag, and throw it away in the trash. Do not save leftover medication or give it to others to use.
